TALKING POINTS
16 JULY 2021**

- It allows for a coordinated approach among suppliers to fill shortages or supply a specific area where there is a demand.
- There are sufficient petroleum products on hand and government is now working to secure its movement.
- The inspiring words of Nelson Mandela that “when people are determined they can overcome anything,” emboldens our efforts to meet the needs of our people.

- The rise in racial tensions in some communities is a cause of great concern.
- Government condemns community members targeting other racial groups and fuelling racial tensions.
- This behaviour will further divide us when we should be united in the fight against the destruction of property.
- Targeting or blaming other races gives those who are trying to sow discord through public violence the upper hand.
- Discrimination based on the colour of one’s skin goes against the very ethos on which our country was founded.
- The Constitution is our guide towards eradicating the divisions and injustices of the past such as racism.
- We must stand as one people against violence and in our commitment to peace and to the rule of law.
- Let us all reject discrimination, violence and chaos, so that can move forward to build our country.
- South Africa belongs to all who live in it and we are united in our diversity.

We are restoring law and order.

- The restoration of law and order is largely due to increased deployment of SANDF, SAPS and metro police members in potential “hotspots”.
- It is also due to the collaboration between the public through structures such as Community Police Forums and by working with law enforcement agencies.
- Law enforcements agencies have now fully reopened the N3 toll route between Cedara in KwaZulu-Natal and Heidelberg in Gauteng.
- Plans are underway to deploy 25 000 soldiers in KwaZulu-Natal and Gauteng, and thousands of boots are already on the ground.

Those who seek to divide us will fail.

- These past few days have shown that South Africans are determined to fight for our democracy and freedom.
- We have seen how the people of our nation have risen to the occasion by rejecting division and protecting our democracy as immortalised by the words of former President Nelson Mandela:

“It is not our diversity which divides us; it is not our ethnicity, or religion or culture that divides us. Since we have achieved our freedom, there can only be one division amongst us: between those who cherish democracy and those who do not.”

- We saw good people across our nation stand up as one to assist in preventing anarchy, looting and violence.
- We saw the best of our nation, as people and communities reached out a helping hand to one another.
- Government is working with our social partners and community formations to defend our democracy.

Report online abuse and threats!

- You are not powerless against online threats and abuse.
- Report any threatening or abusive posts to the police.
- Contact Crime Stop on 08600 10111 to anonymously report criminal activities.
- If you feel you are in immediate danger call your local police station or the 10 111 emergency number.
- Capture a screenshot of the post, and make sure you identify the person or user involved.
- You can take action to protect yourself from threats and abuse.
 - On Facebook, unfriend, block and report the person.
 - On Twitter unfollow, block and report the Tweet by clicking on the “more options” icon on each Tweet.
 - Change your Twitter settings so you just see what you want and avoid as much as possible “low quality” interactions.
 - On Instagram, make your account private and block unwelcome followers.
 - You can stop receiving WhatsApp messages, calls and status updates from certain contacts by blocking them.
 - You can also report problematic content to WhatsApp.
